Students will hear FBI professionals speak on various topics of critical importance including counterterrorism, cyber-crime, organized crime, drug trafficking and white-collar crime, fugitives, civil rights and crimes against children. The course will provide an inside perspective on society as it relates to crime and criminal justice and offer valuable knowledge and teaching activities to educators at all levels as they teach personal safety to their students. K-12 teachers will see how math, science, language arts, business, civics, sociology, criminal justice, government, and law related skills and knowledge are applied in the FBI work place.*

## The Holocaust through Witness Testimony\*¥

3 Semester Credit Hours

*Course approaches Holocaust history from the perspective of primary source testimony with emphasis on local survivors. Topics include analyzing different types of testimony, determining the role of memory history, and personalizes the Holocaust through effective integration of testimony into Holocaust education. Cross-curricular teaching techniques are utilized. Participants experience cross-curricular-teaching techniques appropriate to Holocaust education; become familiar with the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum's Guidelines for Teaching the Holocaust, and gain hands-on practice with primary source analysis. Teachers leave this course with increased personal knowledge of Holocaust history, usable classroom activities, age-appropriate resources, and a familiarity with the recorded testimonies of local Holocaust survivors. This course employs a balanced, multidisciplinary pedagogical approach that includes lectures, guided readings, primary source analysis, exploration of resources and hands-on, in-class development.*

*This course explores works of art in the galleries and teachers learn how to practice and incorporate visual literacy, constructing meaning from a work of art through exploration, critique and reflection. Activities are included that can be used to develop skills in problem solving, critical thinking and written and verbal communication. Have you ever experienced the attraction of a special work of art—painting, sculpture, photograph—that held your attention, inspired your imagination and left you determined to learn more? Children are particularly open to such experiences that, in the hands of an insightful teacher, can be used to open doors to enthusiastic and meaningful participation in other areas of the curriculum. This class will be held at the The Nelson-Atkins Museum of Art, where we explore works of art in the galleries and the Sculpture Park. Led by a former Nelson-Atkins curator and educator, teachers learn how visual literacy can enhance K-12 instruction in creative and expository writing, history, cultural diversity and context, and even science. Course structure includes slide lectures, guided gallery tours and interactive activities, readings, and substantial discussion and shared experience. Teachers are introduced to the Nelson educational staff as they visit the Museum's Educator Resource Center and explore the wide range of circulating resources (DVD's, books, slides, CD's) available to teachers to enhance lesson plans across the curricula. This course is taught by a former Nelson-Atkins curator and educator.*

Teachers attain increased personal knowledge of Holocaust history, and are introduced to usable age-appropriate classroom activities and resources. Teachers also become familiar with appropriate online resources. Content and activities are appropriate for junior high, middle school, and high school educators ONLY. Participants are responsible for completing assigned readings from the course textbook and posted primary source material. Additional materials are provided in the form of links to reputable Holocaust websites and teaching materials. Grades are based on posting short essay responses to weekly questions and three slightly longer essays which synthesize course readings. As a final project, participants design teaching activities appropriate for their 7-12 classrooms. Teachers need a high speed internet connection for viewing video components and image rich websites.
