
# Student Trip to Milton Friedman's Summer Home in Vermont -Capitaf

Through a generous donation, Dr. Russ McCullough collaborated with other university professors to bring students to a 4 day colloquium event in August about Milton Friedman's Free-to-Choose book. Two students from OUKS, one student from OUAZ attended the event. Here is video summary of reflections from students about the event.

# Screening of "Little Pink House" Movie

On September 8<sup>th</sup> we screened the movie *Little Pink Houses* and had over 100 attendees and 90 unique survey responses. This movie screening included live comments about eminent domain and individual rights from our guest speaker, Sam MacRoberts, of the Kansas Policy Institute. Almost half of the attendees rated their knowledge of eminent domain as a 1 or 2 out of 5 before viewing the movie and hearing the guest speaker. After the movie and speaker, over 80% rated their understanding as a "4" or higher. The survey also showed satisfaction with the

#### event overall.



These numbers indicate that students both learned a lot about eminent domain and enjoyed doing so. Of the event one students said, "I enjoyed learning about things that have to do with working class/poor families. It's very related and hits home, I would love to come to another event just like this."


## Bitcoin Standard Book Club


# **Economics and Environmentalism Colloquium**

On November 14<sup>th</sup> 2020 we held an Economics and Environmentalism Colloquium composed of readings on free market environmentalism including Terry Anderson, Elinor Ostrom, Frederic Bastiat, James Buchanan, Bruce Yandle, and others. We had 12 student attendees. Out of those 12 attendees, there was a significant increase in knowledge surrounding free market environmental solutions as shown by the following charts.

Rate your knowledge of free market environmental solutions AFTER the discussion. 12 responses




Not only was there a surveyed increase in knowledge, but the colloquium also led to 11/12 students changing their view on the solutions to environmental problems. One student said, "I thought it was a really great discussion that expressed many points of view not just from an economics or environmental standpoint but from other standpoints and backgrounds as well."

# Philosophy, Politics, and Economics (PPE) League

The Gwartney Institute faculty created an intercollegiate competition where teams competed on philosophy, politics, and economics. The event was held April 20<sup>th</sup> and was a competition between Ottawa University (six students) and Emporia State University (three students). The competition included a policy case competition, game theory competition, a video game competition, and an educational commercial competition. The topic of the league competition was federalism. The participants in the competition rated a significant increase in knowledge.

In the policy case competition, students laid out a verbal case for whether COVID-19 vaccine rollouts should be handled at a national or federal level.



# Federalism Book Club

Our Federalism Book Club occurred February 24<sup>th</sup>, March 3<sup>rd</sup>, and April 7<sup>th</sup>. We had 14 students attend and discuss several excerpts of books and articles on Federalism in theory and practice. These included material by Alex Tabarrok, Barry Weingast, and others. Before the book club, ten of the attendees rated their knowledge of Federalism as a 1 or 2 out of 5. After the book club, every student rated their knowledge as a 3 or better. We got a lot of good feedback from students including:





Every attendee agreed they would be interested in participating in similar events in the future.


# Q&A with Dr. Jim Gwartney

On February 25<sup>th</sup> we organized an event with the Institute's namesake, Dr. Jim Gwartney, to do a Q&A on the importance of economic freedom. This event was unique in that it was our first event geared primarily toward Ottawa's online students and Arizona campus students. The event reached 64 students. Attendees were provided with a pre-recorded lecture, and they were given the opportunity to ask Dr. Gwartney questions based on the lecture in real time via Zoom. There was a total of 65 questions which were posed, which we compiled into a more manageable list. The gains in knowledge were significant.




# Screening of "The Social Dilemma" Movie

In February, we had 56 students attend a showing of the movie *The Social Dilemma*. During the movie we held an intermission and discussed the dangers of being excessively monitored, and we critiqued some of the solutions proposal by the movie such as regulation. Specifically, we lectured on the concept of regulatory capture which seems to have had a significant effect on the attendee's knowledge.

Homeschool Area Course—This summer Dr. Jacobsen developed a free economics 101 course to local area homeschoolers. During the COVID-19 pandemic, homeschooling grew tremendously, and we believe there is a great opportunity to reach this community in Ottawa. There are currently close to 20 students interested in the course, and the professors are working with the parents to find a good time for an informational meeting. The course will utilize free and open textbook resources (such as those offered by Russ Roberts) combined with Dr. James Gwartney's *Common Sense Economics* book.

Dual Credit Course— Dr. McCullough has spearheaded the creation of a microeconomics dual credit course which can be offered to high school students. This course will hopefully help us reach out to high school students potentially interested in coming to OU.
