Undergraduate Student Engagement

Catan Game Night

Attendance: 16 Description:

In our midyear update we reported feedback from students who hoped we would host a Catan Board game tournament. Catan is a good event for our students in PPE programs for two reasons. First, it teaches strategic action and the value of mutually beneficial exchanges. Second, a game similar to Catan is used in our PPE League competition each year.

We had 16 students attend. Our students rated their satisfaction an average of 9.3 out of 10 for the game choice. Satisfaction with the event was rated an average of 9.5 out of 10. One student highlighted the importance of trade in their comments:

"My wheat resource kept getting blocked by the robber and there wasn't many 5's being rolled for wood so when they occasional 5 was rolled I built towards a port and gained a trade in. With that trade in I was able to essentially cut off another player from another wheat spot and claim it for myself and eventually that earned me the W.




Breakfast Book Club: Black Liberation Through the Marketplace

Attendance: 13 Description:

This year for our book club we read Rachel Ferguson and Marcus Witcher's book, Black Liberation Through the Marketplace. The book describes how African American's were able to gain liberty and success by exchange on the free market. It also highlighted attempts to limit African American's access to free markets throughout the late 20th and early 21st century.

We had 14 students and one student affairs employee join us for the book club. Students rated their knowledge gain.

Dr. Rachel Ferguson Speaker Event




Dr. Rachel Ferguson came to give a talk at Ottawa University on the topic of how Classical Liberalism relates to racial equality. In the talk, she focused on her book's research which we discussed in the book club the prior year. Dr. Ferguson highlighted how classic liberal ideas have long been on the side of promoting racial equality, and how the African American community benefit from access to a free and open marketplace. The event was well-attended, and students remained for a Q&A session after her talk.




- "I honestly thought her speech was very informative. It was great hearing things from a more factual instead of opinionated standpoint. Honestly enjoyable."

PPE League Competition

Attendance: 38 Description:

For the third year, Ottawa University put on a PPE League competition—an intercollegiate competition which focuses on the ideas of politics, philosophy, and economics. Students compete in a game theory competition, a strategic video game competition, a commercial creation competition, and a policy case competition.

This year the competition included Lindenwood University, Emporia State University, Pitt State, Park University, and Ottawa University. With five universities, this is the largest PPE League competition yet. Ottawa University placed 2nd behind Lindenwood this year.

The video game competition for this year used an online version of Settlers of Catan. Students competed in the Ottawa University Esports Arena.





For the game theory competition this year students competed in a prisoners' dilemma game where they were paired up and had the chance to cooperate for more total points or betray one another for more individual points. However, if both players betrayed each other, neither would earn points. There was both a point reward for the team as a whole and a cash reward for the individual with the highest score. This led to some interesting results, such as team members undermining their own team to earn cash.

Here is a selection of comments we received:

"Thoroughly enjoyed making the commercial with the students, and thoroughly enjoyed starting the competition in this way, seeing what the other schools produced. It's a fantastic idea for the competition. Our commercial will hopefully start the thinking process for a student to ask about the difference between rule of law and rule of man. commercial was not so explicit in content but conveyed the great relationship between students and faculty so that new students might join our group and learn more about themes like rule of law vs. rule of man, federalism, the free market, etc."

"The competition is equal parts preparation and thinking on your feet. I learned some of the ways the rule of law provides freedom within structure."

"I had no real preconceptions about these topics, however hearing the policy cases made me consider multiple positions."
